DIRECTIONS TO THE MONASTERY

From Highway 101 - Exit Hwy 126 East at Ventura

Travel 11 miles east along Hwy 126 and exit 10th St/Hwy 150 at Santa Paula.

Turn left from the exit ramp and follow 10th St/Hwy 150 through Santa Paula.

Bear right at the fork in the road. This is Ojai Rd/Hwy 150.

Travel about 5 miles (1/4 mile past Thomas Aquinas College) to 15799 Ojai Road.

The monastery driveway is on the right just past our mailbox at Highway Marker 2830.

Drive across the bridge and follow the signs to the parking area.

From Highway 5 - Exit Hwy 126 West at Santa Clarita

Travel 27 miles to Santa Paula, and exit at 10th St/Hwy 150.

Turn right from the exit ramp and follow 10th St/Hwy 150 through Santa Paula.

Bear right at the fork in the road. This is Ojai Rd/Hwy 150. Continue as directed above.



Dear Friends,

These are exciting days for us now that the County of Ventura has approved our building design plans. Our architects are hard at work completing the construction drawings for the new chapel. Once the drawings are ready, it will take perhaps only three months before the County issues our building permit. This puts the commencement of actual construction around the Feast of St. Barbara on December 4th. In working with the County, however, "patience is the name of the game." So, we are not really counting on this schedule. But just having a rough idea of what our timetable might be -- not to mention thinking that one year from now we might well be having services in our new chapel -- is very pleasant, indeed.

In the meantime, there are many things to consider and many important decisions to be made. This very week, we spoke with the contractor who will most likely be the supervisor and our consultant for the construction, because we have decided to take the "owner/builder" route of doing the job. Ryassaphor-monk Lawrence, whom we have been calling our "project manager," will actually be fulfilling the role of contractor for us. Besides saving us a great deal of money, this approach will make it easier to change aspects of the project as we go along, should we want to, and to use volunteer help on the construction.

Meanwhile, our imagination has been captured thoroughly by Fr. John Finley's novel and insightful ideas on church architecture presented at last month's Friend's gathering. He stirred our creative energies with his description of an imaginary church building imaging forth the Heavenly Jerusalem of Revelation, Chapter 21. Shall we make the floor in the altar look like jasper? Shall we make the iconostas gold instead of staining it to look like cherry wood?

Importantly, amidst all this interesting (and some not so interesting, it must be admitted) planning of how to build what will in fact be the center of life at St. Barbara Monastery, we are reminded repeatedly of the words of the Lord in the Gospel: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness, and all these things shall be added unto you." We have not been allowed to forget that what we are really engaged in building here is, in the end, no mere structure of wood and concrete, but first and foremost the Kingdom of God. If this is not our principle activity and goal, our efforts to build St. Barbara Monastery are all for nothing.
