

Dear Friends of St. Barbara Monastery,

Not long ago, a priest who is a close friend of our monastery preached a sermon on the Samaritan woman and her encounter with our Lord at Jacob's Well (John 4). He drew our attention to one particular verse of this passage from St. John's gospel:

If you knew the gift of God, and Who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked Him, and He would have given you living water.

--John 4:10

If you knew the gift of God... What a striking phrase! Imagine God Himself saying this to each one of us. Could it be that Heaven itself is trying to break through to us, waiting only for our hearts to be attuned to Him? Indeed, our Heavenly King is the ultimate Treasury of blessings and "every good and perfect gift is from above and comes down from the Father of lights..." (James 1:17) As our heavenly Father who loves us, He desires to give us good gifts! Yet, may God forgive us: How is it that we, His children, go about our daily lives in a kind of tunnel vision—an *earthbound* tunnel vision, as this priest reminded us—so that, sadly, we overlook His precious gifts for us in the moment?

The gift of God's grace, the subtle working of the Holy Spirit in our hearts, comes to us in a multitude of forms. This time of year at the monastery, the wildlife around us seems to make more of an appearance than at other seasons: a couple of wide-eyed fawn—still with their spots—venture curiously toward the sisters, then dash off to their calling mother, racing through rows of lavender; a busy squirrel dashes haltingly up a mountain of mulch to collect an acorn; a hummingbird flits around flowering fruit trees, coming close enough for us to observe its exquisitely fashioned body and to hear the fanlike buzzing of its tireless little wings. Witnessing these small, unexpected graces, we feel ourselves catch our breath, a lump rise in our throats, and cannot help but remember that God's gifts are, in fact, all around us—at every moment of every day.

All is gift! Not simply the general gift of His marvelous creation, but He bestows on us countless other specific gifts too: the unexpected gift of seeing our own hidden sins, the tears of repentance that wash us anew, a phrase from Holy Scripture that grips our minds, a sudden insight that illumines our heart, even the hard gifts of His grace that come through our painful failures and, yes, even the tragedies He allows in our lives. If only we had eyes to perceive truly, perhaps we would realize that, in the end, "all is gift."

Is there a gift that God wishes to give to me in this moment that I'm not aware of? If so, what is it? Turning our hearts to God throughout the day, let us wait on Him with due attention and be open to receiving His—perhaps startling!—answer.



We are enjoying the bounty fresh, baked, and blended, as well as freezing and sharing our harvest. Truly God has

blessed the fruits of the season!
